7 Signs of TERRORISM

<u>Surveillance</u> - The recording or monitoring of activities with a camera; note taking, marking of maps, etc.

<u>Elicitation</u> - People or organizations trying to gain information about infrastructure, people, or military operations

Tests of Security - Attempts to measure reaction times or to penetrate physical security barriers in order to assess strengths and weaknesses

Acquisition of Supplies - Purchase or theft of explosives, weapons, or ammunition; acquisition of military or emergency responder uniforms or decals, flight manuals, passes or badges

<u>Suspicious Persons Out of Place</u> - People who do not belong in the workplace, neighborhood, or in a particular building

Dry Runs/Trial Runs - Putting people into position and moving them around according to their plan without actually committing the terrorist act.

<u>Deployment of Assets</u> - People and supplies getting into position to commit the act. This is a person's last chance to alert authorities before the terrorist act occurs.



ONE SEAL

The Oklahoma Information Fusion Center, (OIFC) is a collaborative effort between local, state, tribal, and federal law enforcement agencies, public safety agencies and private industry all working together,



under one seal, to provide a central hub of intelligence information for the State of Oklahoma. The OIFC seeks to break down barriers in communication between agencies to facilitate the enhanced sharing of information to better protect the citizens of Oklahoma.

CONNECTING THE DOTS

The Fusion Center gathers information from law enforcement, media, private industry and citizens to search for clues or indicators of terrorist activities. Seemingly unrelated information is reviewed and analyzed to seek connections that may indicate that a threat exists. Connecting the dots of information to give them meaning can help predict and prevent crime. Once the dots are connected and a clear picture of the threat is produced, the information is supplied to the appropriate entities so that action can be taken to neutralize that threat. The OIFC is committed to performing this function while protecting the privacy rights of all citizens.

The OIFC is an "all crimes, all hazards" center. The OIFC recognizes that terrorists use criminal enterprises to support their operation, so we must look at all crimes to evaluate whether or not a terrorism nexus exists. Although its primary purpose is the prevention of terrorism, the OIFC can play a vital role in identifying criminal enterprises, assisting law enforcement officials in their response to natural disasters as well as their crime prevention efforts.

YOUR ROLE

The Intelligence Analysts who work in the OIFC try to develop relationships with private sector subject matter experts to assist them in understanding of issues of importance to that industry and how the fusion process can better serve them. The information provided by our partners is the life blood that feeds the heart of the fusion center. Together we can work to predict and prevent another tragedy.

The OIFC seal represents everyone who helps protect Oklahoma from terrorism. It symbolizes the dedication and spirit of cooperation of all Oklahomans in the prevention of terrorism. It is our seal. It is your seal.

THE OKLAHOMA QUESTION

The analysts who work in the Oklahoma Information Fusion Center monitor the world for events that may affect Oklahoma. When an event occurs, analysts ask these questions and more:

"How does the event affect Oklahoma?"

"How could the event affect Oklahoma in the future?"

"Could a similar event occur in Oklahoma?"

"Does Oklahoma have similar criminal groups?"

"Are the items used in an attack available in Oklahoma?"

"Is Oklahoma ready to respond should a similar incident occur in Oklahoma?"
